The reason of this secret was because the Americans tried hard afterward to find the body, and even offered money for it, so as to take it with them as a trophy of their victory, but failed, and I am glad of it, and I am sure it never shall be found.'

while others are broader and lower, with many feathers upon them. The trimming surrounds the crown and is the only positive rule, as in some bonnets, it is massive on top, in some on the left side, while others have their greater abundance down the middle of the crown, with merely a band around

Marie Stuart pointed fronts, with amole sides, are among the new shapes for lressy bonnets to be worn by ladies who like broad bonnets, as opposed to the present narrow shapes. The point is not always directly in the middle of the forehead, but it is sometimes a trifle

to the left. Velvet is most used for the bonnet proper; bias silks are twisted with velvet for trimmings, but soft twilled or basket-woven ribbons, or these with double-face satin on one side and gros grain on the other, are preferred for twisting around the crown and for the



It is also expected that he shall sift to the bottom or as near as he can get it. the compaints which are so commonly made by the public against the public servants, and vindicate the characters of them against whom such com-

plaints are found to have been maliciously or wrongfully made. But where the contrary is the case, where the officer has flagrantly abused the trust reposed to his keeping by the people, then assuredly will the fearless and uncontaminated journal see justice done, and the honor and purity of the public offices maintained to the highest degree practicable. 

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

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
