LIVERMORE FIREBRICK CO. From the Livermore Herald Jan. 21, 1911 (from Barbara Bunshaw) "The Livermore Firebrick Co. turned out its first firebricks bearing the name of Livermore this week..."

Robert Woods and Wm. Twisselman both brought us specimens of Livermore fire-bricks and information about them. Mr. Twisselman began working for the fire-brick company in 1923 and thinks the Premium bricks found by Jim Delgado at New Almaden date from about that time.

Ernest Gohler Sr. continues to bring us interesting items about Coast Manufacturing Co. Mr. Twisselman remarked that in 1923 there were only two places to work in Livermore, the brickworks and the fuse works (Coast Man. Co.) I mentioned the hospitals and he said their workers mostly came from out of town.

LIVERMORE HISTORIC BUILDING SURVEY Guild member Garrett Drummond presented a well organized orientation meeting on Oct. 14. Each participant was provided with clear, easy to follow instructions for taking part in the survey. Since then, workers have been canvasing the Livermore streets completing the survey forms. The Heritage Guild can be proud of this work.

Miss Waldhorn's program on Nov. 5 fits in with the survey. She will show us what has been done in San Francisco to preserve old houses and the problems of preservation in general. All those who are interested in restoring old houses either for personal enjoyment or for profit, should hear her program.

MAY SCHOOL The concrete foundation for the old school is now in place and all that remains to be done is for the building to settle itself down into a level and square position once more! It is an attractive structure and its restoration under the direction of Dorothy and David Nielsen will be a joy to the whole valley.

PLANS FOR THE NEW YEAR We will continue to work for the preservation of Livermore's historic resources. In particular, we will study and discuss the preservation of a beautiful area of native wildlife alond the Arroyo del Valle in Sycamore Grove Park and the equally valuable Cresta Blanca Winery nearby. The winery already has a state historical marker on it. We also plan to study the "Arroyo Road Route Plan", a \$70,000 (so we understand) joint County and City plan for the development of the Arroyo Rd. since it includes these historically significant sites as well as others along the way, such as the beautiful Olivina gateway.

MILL SQUARE Once more, Livermore has a "Mill Square" and a fine open space in the middle of town. We are pleased when old names are recaptured from Livermore history. At the dedication of the Square on Saturday Oct. 23, Miss Pearl Carlisle, granddaughter of Calfin J. Stevens, for whose mill the square was named was a special guest. There was a pleasant meeting of a group of Livermore's founding citizens.



DUARTE GARAGE AND LINCOLN HIGHWAY MUSEUM The "garage sale" netted over \$700 towards the increased insurance and other expenses and we plan to continue to have sales. A storage area for donations has been designated. We will not collect adult clothing in the future but will be happy to accept donations of other items. If you want to contribute, please call Leslie Jensen 443-0406 or Janet Newton, 447-9592.

We have received many gifts that we are thankful for. Soon after the news that the 1920 Searave firetruck had been put into the museum, we got a call from Al Voegele to say that he had a motor-meter to donate to its restoration. Mr. Voegele found the meter on East Ave. about nine years ago. It is a Seagrave motor-meter!

Next, our good friend David Bentham of Fremont made a special trip to bring to us a brass plate of the Tidewater Associated Oil Co. with the oil company's creed on it. The garage was once an Associated Oil Co. gasoline station. Last Saturday we got a call from Carol Blaney to say that she would like to give us two Associated road maps circa 1937-38. (Carol is a member of the Armstrong family of Collier Canyon.)

Dr. Ralph Newton found, near the garage, a small plate marked "Durant Star Flint" and at the bottom, "Highway Garage, Livermore, Calif. F. H. Duarte, Prop. Phone 165" In the center of the plate is a car's service record.

Not yet mentioned is a gift of two old maps pertaining to Coast Manufacturing Company brought to us by Ernest F. Gohler Sr. They show the location of the highway in this area when it was part of the Lincoln Highway.

We are grateful to all our generous frinds.

The house at the garage has been brought back to code and it now in use by Harold and Ruth Gabriel. Plans for the development of the whole property will be made and we are pleased that Bob McCabe, the architect of the Ravenswood restoration, has agreed to advise us about them.

LIVERMORE PRESERVATION ORDINANCE The ordinance calls for the creation of a Heritage Preservation Commission composed of the Design Review Committee plus a member of the Livermore Heritage Guild. Our member will be Garrett Drummond. The purpose of the Commission is to recognise, protect and promote the retention and use of the heritage resources in the City.

One of the first items to be studied is the old house at the northwest corner of 3rd and Mc Leod, once the home of Supervisor Dan Murphy. We will ask the City for a stay of the demolition permit to give time to prepare facts to show that there would be a cultural and financial benefit to the community by saving the structure.

ARCHITECTURAL RESOURCE SURVEY The results from the October survey have been summarized. Garrett Drummond reports that his survey teams have identified and recorded 660 pre-1940 buildings in Livermore, about half of which are still in original condition. The final tally is as follows: Pioneer (saltbox), 170; Italianate, 31; Carpenter Gothic, 2; Queen Anne,58; Shingle, 12; Bungalow, 232; Mission Revival, 46; unidentifiable, 83.

One hundred and fifty two structures were noted by the survey teams as noteworthy style examples of as possible candidates for early preservation action.

Garrett wants to extend his thanks to Tony Bolander, Janet and Ralph Newton, Roberta Hadley, John Hiskes, Carl Schneider, Toni Tami, Charles and Barbara Otto and Dorothy Nielsen for their help on the survey.

A final, more complete report on the survey results will be available soon at the History Center.

BICENTENNIAL A recent disbursement of funds by the Livermore Bicentennial Organization collected from the sale of Anza Expedition booklets reveals that the LBO netted at least \$560 from this project. The booklet was financed by \$1000 from the Alameda County Bicentennial Commission, \$250 from the Heritage Guild and \$250 from the Livermore Cultural Arts Council. The LBO members worked hard on the sales and distribution of the booklet but the LBO did not contribute to the cost of it. 1155 booklets were sold for a total of \$1397. The Heritage Guild has received \$107.58 return of its \$250 investment.

At the last LBO meeting it was decided to proceed with one last project. As reported earlier, the LBO received a special California Bicentennial award plaque for the Livermore monument. (As far as we know it is the only such award in Alameda County). The monument is now in a plain slab of concrete in the park adjacent to the garage museum, now the Lincoln Highway Park. It is proposed to build a shelter, or ramada, behind the historical marker that would be in keeping with the Livermore family's famed hospittality. It will be a place where travelers can stop for a rest or a picnic in a pleasantly shaded spot.

The arbor-with-benches that was built in the little park at 5th St. and South Livermore Ave. by the Rotary Club would be a suitable model. Associated Professions is willing to let the LBO use the plans they made for it and it is hoped that LBO workers will assemble the timbers of the essentially simple structure. It was decided that there was probably enough money in the treasury to pay for the lumber. At Fifth St. there is a vine growing over the shelter and altogether it is very attractive.

We hope that if there is money in the LBO account after building the shelter and after disposing of left-over Bicentennial merchandise, etc., that the Heritage Guild will receive a further repayment of its \$250 investment in the booklet. We still need money to carry on with the projects we started in the Bicentennial year.

CORRECTION FOR OUR "VISIT OLD LIVERMORE" HOUSE TOUR BOOKLET Adele Kruger (a member of the Reimers family) says that the house at 615 South K St. was the home of Julius Jacobs who owned the Livermore Soda Works. The business was on K St. between nos. 615 and 685. Mrs. Julius Jacobs was also a member of the Reimers family. More about the Livermore Soda Works at a later date.

NEWS OF THE HERITAGE GUILD BOARD OF DIRECTORS About a month ago, Dr. Ted Perkins, to our great regret, resigned from the board because of moving from Livermore. Ted has been an important part of our publications program and we hope that he will continue to be a consultant. We need his help.

<u>CARNEGIE BUILDING</u> It is really heart-warming for the Guild to see the restoration of the old library. The work is being directed by Dorothy Svets of the LARPD under the guidance of historical architect Bob McCabe. This is the way to treat our old buildings!

Also to the credit of the LARPD is the bringing to fruition of the plans to save the Buckley estate at Raveswood. The first step was obtaining the State grant to begin the project and then carrying on through the time-taking preliminary work to the actual restoration. There was a very good chance of our losing this beautiful estate but now we are sure of being able to enjoy it for a long time. One of the first activities of the Heritage Guild was an open house at Ravenswood on a freezing day in December 1973. In spite of the bitter weather a large number of people turned out to inspect the old buildings. The buildings were not heated!

OUR MEMORIAL FUND has been increased by a contribution from Mr. & Mrs. John Wallace in memory of Everett Finigan. Mr. Finigan was a woodcarver whose personality and art work were enjoyed by all those in the Livermore community who knew him.

DUARTE GARAGE & LINCOLN HIGHWAY MUSEUM We were pleased to hear from Bradford Paul of the SF office of the National Trust for Historic Preservation that he was delighted to read of the LHG's interest in converting the 60-yr. old garage into museum because it offers a creative approach to the traditional museum concept. We have made an application to the NTHP for a Consultant Service Grant. We hope it will enable us to obtain expert advice on how to proceed in order to achieve the maximum potential of the building.

In our list of donations to the garage museum we omitted a contribution from LHG member Myrtle Jewett of Sacramento. Mrs. Jewett sent us copies of two pages in the State Archives. One is a 1905 "Register of Chauffeurs" and the other is an "Index to Owners & Dealers". Both include the names J.P. Thiessen and Dr. Wm. S. Taylor. Mr. Thiessen of Pleasanton (a relative of Mrs. Jewett) operated a "Covert, etc." and Dr. Taylor of Livermore a "Haynes, etc."

<u>NEW BOARD MEMBER</u> We are pleased to report that at the last board meeting Garrett B. Drummond, Jr. was made a Director. Gary has demonstrated his value to the Guild in his work on the Livermore Historic Building Survey.

IN MEMORY OF BESSIE DRURY On December 16, our very dear friend and valued Livermore historian Bessie Hargrave Drury died in Walnut Creek. She was 92. Bessie spent her school days in Livermore and she loved the townrand its people dearly. She was a niece of Emma Smith and a granddaughter of Henry Clay Smith (called the father of Alameda County) who died in a house on Third St., Livermore, in 1876. Bessie's grandmother was a Harlan who crossed the plains in the same year as the Donner party. MONTHLY MEETING, THURSDAY, Feb. 10th, new Library Meeting Room, 7.30 p.m.

This will be an informational meeting about the future of the Arroyo Road and its extension into Livermore along South L Street. We will have: a brief history of the road with a show of old pictures; Charles Crohare will talk about the present condition of the Olivina Winery, Cresta Blanca Winery and the new Sycamore Park (that occupies part of the creek bed of the Arroyo Valle); Alice Tetlow, LARPD naturalist, will tell us about her proposal for a wild-preserve area along the creek (she will show slides), George Bing will give us the point of view of a member of the Sierra Club; Jack Stear will display his copy of the Arroyo Road Route Plan (a City-County study for the long-range development of the road) and Director of Public Works Dan Lee will give us the point of view of the City engineers. Helping to moderate the meeting will be LHG's Preservation Officer, Garrett Drummond.

Since this will be a regular board meeting, we will allow 30 mins. for routine business and we will begin the above program at 8 p.m. We hope that we will have a good attendance. If time permits we will discuss the issues of the subject.

DUARTE GARAGE AND LINCOLN HIGHWAY MUSEUM Our application for a Consultant Service Grant has been received by the National Trust and we will be told the outcome of it before the middle of February. We have started collecting items for our next Garage Sale which will be in late spring. Please call us if you want to donate items - Leslie Jensen 443-0406, Janet Newton 447-9592, Barbara Otto 447-7977. We will not collect adult clothing at this time but will accept just about anything else.

MAY SCHOOL We have made an application to the Alameda County Parks Advisory Commission for a share of the \$4 million allocated to Alameda County (from the bond issue passed last Nov.). We need money to provide a pump and tank and tower (and, we hope, a windmill); for plumbing for bathrooms; for a new concrete cover for the septic tank; for heating and insulation; for electrical work; for landscaping and walkways; and for paint for inside and out. The first items will make it possible for a caretaker to live on the site.

VALUABLE GIFTS FROM OUR GENEROUS FRIENDS, Handed over to us informally by Louis L. Stein Jr., a packet of papers that included the following: handwritten notes by Dr. Albert Shumate on Blind Boss Buckley (Buckley was the man who built the Ravenswood estate on the Arroyo Rd.); an ad from a book of 1898 for "Theo. Gier Company" "Vineyard, Livermore, Cal."; a letter from Wetmore-Bowen Co., Cresta Blanca, Calif. to the auditor of Western Pacific Co., dated Jan.3, 1910; and a photocopy of an ad for "Theo Gier, Wine and Liquor Merchant, Oakland" dated 1895.

These are valuable artifacts and they add greatly to our collection of archival meterial. Dr. Shumate's notes begin "Few San Franciscans are immortalized by Robert Louis Stevenson, but Buckley was." He goes on to quote The

Wrecker published in 1892. It is hoped that we will be able to publish a booklet on the Buckley estate and this material will be included in it.

Please accept our thanks Louis. (Mr. & Mrs. Stein are LHG members.)

Another valuable contribution to our resources was received from Mr. and Mrs. Malvern Sweet. They have given us fossilized oyster shells from the area of the valley where there is a whole strata of rock composed of such fossils. We know from old maps and old reference material that marine fossils were found in various places (Robert Livermore found a skeleton of a whale, for example) and it is wonderful to have part of the actual evidence to display in the History Center. Fossils such as these are safe for school children to handle (they are rugged and heavy) and the students will enjoy the experience. We are really grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Sweet.

CORRECTIONS Garrett Drummond reports that the names of Tania Selden and Bruce Shore were inadvertently left off the list of people who helped with the October Historic Resources Survey. Thanks for their assistance is due to these two also.

In the December <u>Newsletter</u> we referred to the 1915 Columbian Exposition when we know perfectly well that 1915 was the year of the Panama Pacific Exposition in San Francisco! This happened because the typist looked to check if the PPIE was mentioned in the copy (it wasn't) and turned around and typed in 1915. A sad case.

Sept. 3, 1921: "Harold Wright and company had a narrow escape when the rear wheel of an auto collapsed on Arroyo del Valle."

Demetra Wilson and Carrie Alexander gave short talks about their view of how valuable the garage museum could be. Lois Elsaesser, Chairman of the Board of the LARPD, LARPD General Manager Bill Payne and Livermore Fire Chief Jack Baird participated in the discussion.

It was decided to hold a special meeting on May 19 to decide what direction to give to Bob McCabe for the preparation of plans for development of the property. Co-Chairmen Carl Schneider and Chet Fankhauser led the discussion. It was decided to plan for a museum showing people at work, with two principal themes - transportation (the Lincoln Highway) and agriculture, and to provide for flexibility and variety.

Through the courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Duarte a collection of old photographs of the garage and of the Duarte family were shown. The old photos of the garage facade were particularly valuable. It was decided to repaint the old signs even though Bob McCabe advised us that it would probably cost over \$1000.

There was a vocal solo 'Won't you Tell me Why Robin?' by Miss Lina Carter, (with guitar accompaniment) and the tableau 'The Drunkard's Dream and its Effects' by Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Beck,

The sum of \$6.15 was realized which will be given to the Sunday School Organ Fund. Next Secial, August 10 (full moon) at the schoolhouse."

<u>DUARTE GARAGE AND LINCOLN HIGHWAY MUSEUM</u> Thanks to the efforts of Bill Junk, we have had two valuable donations to our collection of artifacts. One is an old gas pump, donated by Mrs. Pearl Higgins of Hayward and the other is a portable gasoline cart that used to be in the Associated Oil station at First and L Streets, donated by Mr. G.W.Bireley. We thank the donors very much.

The LHG Directors voted to allocate \$500 towards the cost of electrical work in the garage. This first step will include a meter and fuse-box to replace the old one that was disconnected when the dwelling was re-wired. Chet Fankhauser and Carl Schneider are in charge of this work.

MAY SCHOOL REPORT The difficult job of obtaining the necessary heavy timbers for the space between the concrete foundation and the walls, at no cost to us, has been solved by Dorothy and David Nielsen. There is still an enormous amount of work to be done both to the main building and the outbuildings. A small outside bathroom was wrecked by vandals last year but the Guild is taking action to recover the cost of replacing the plumbing and repairing the building.

We received a letter from Barry Schrader recently asking for a report on the future of the school. We answered that having saved the architecture from being demolished we are open to suggestions about an adaptive use for it. This is in keeping with the underlying principle of a revolving fund. The basic objective is to preserve useful and attractive documents of the past (buildings are valuable documents). Since it would not be feasible or desirable to make all our old buildings into museums, we must find new uses for them so that they can have a continuous useful life in the community. If you have suggestions for the future of the May School, please contact Leslie Jensen, Revolving Fund Chairman or Garrett Drummond, Preservation Officer. Any new use would be controlled by the LHG - with regard to exterior appearance.

THE SPEAKER WILL BE BOB McCABE, architect.

Beginning at 8 p.m., after a short board meeting, Mr. McCabe will show us his slides of the Old Sacramento project and talk to us about adaptive use of old buildings with particular reference to the May School

The efforts to preserve Old Sacramento began as early as 1961 when there was a special meeting of the National Trust to protest the planned development of a freeway system that would have destroyed the historic area. The outlook for preserving the area seemed dim at that time but the fact is that the freeway plans were changed and the demolition of the historic area averted. The slides you will see show what the area looks like now.

RE THE ECONOMICS OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION: A U.S. Dept. of Commerce survey estimates that a community attracting a couple of dozen tourists a day throughout the year is comparable to acquiring a new industry with an annual payroll of \$100,000. An LHG member adds that tourists don't cause overcrowding of the schools.

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GUILD ARCHITECTURAL SURVEY GETS STATE-WIDE PUBLICITY by Garrett Drummond The architectural survey in which a number of Guild members participtated last fall was the subject of an article in the July Newsletter of CALIFORNIANS FOR PRESERVATION ACTION. The article is most complimentary of the Guild's efforts in initiating the first step toward a comprehensive list of the city's historical resources. The list has been adopted by the city Heritage Preservation Commission as an interim survey and the basis of a further in-depth Note: We are indebted to Gary for this fine work. The photo of the Fassett house by Ed Peiffer that is in the article is nice too.

MURPHY HOUSE PROPOSED FOR THE NATIONAL REGISTER The D.J.Murphy house at 291 Mc Leod was placed in nomination to the National Register of Historic Places by the State Historical Resources Commission at the recent meeting in Southern California. At the same time, the Murphy house was listed as a state Historic Resource. This is another step which the Heritage Guild has taken to assist in preserving a local historic and architectural resource. A spokesman for the state Office of Historic Preservation tells us that we will know within the next three to six months whether the National Register nomination is accepted by the Dept. of the Interior. In the meantime, Guild representatives will continue working with the property owner to keep the house secure and unvandalized.

CREST HOTEL ARCHITECTURAL ELEMENTS SAVED The Heritage Guild is storing a group of window hoods and cornice brackets that were saved during the demolition of the Crest Hotel on North Livermore Avenue. The city Heritage Preservation Commission made arrangements with the property owner for the salvage and the Guild will have priority rights to their use. One of the possible uses to which these elements can be put is on the south end of the Duarte Garage, which could add window trim similar to that on the north end.
