NEW PROJECTS: The chairman received board approval to undertake two new Guild projects this year. They are an Oral History program where local pioneers will be interviewed on tape recordings and the tapes preserved in the History Center files, and secondly, a Local Historical Essay Contest at the high schools where the best papers written will receive cash awards and a plaque for the school. Also, a third project will hopefully be arriving in the form of a 1944 Mack firetruck from the City Fire Department this fall and board member Jerry Bireley agreed to coordinate its care and refurbishing. The board also agreed to go ahead with the sandblasting and sign painting on the Duarte Garage & Lincoln Highway Museum as soon as the city concurs with the plans. On Sept. 17 chairman Schrader appeared before the City Heritage Preservation Commission to show the Garage painting plans and the Commission voted unanimously to approve those plans as presented. Next they have to be filed with the City Planning Department.

OPEN HOUSE: Volunteers are being sought to operate the History Center during the Fall Festival of Arts which centers around the Carnegie Building. We want to have one or two docents on duty all during the two day event Saturday and Sunday, Oct. 4-5. To volunteer call Barbara Bunshah (447-5065). Stop in and see our new exhibit of Robert Livermore's "Round-the-Horn House" in pictures, words and even some original timbers from it. Our curator Janet Newton completed the display early in September. This is the house that the square piano now in the History 'Center came from!

DONATION RECEIVED

IN MEMORY OF 'JOE' CARATTI: A donation has been received in memory of Aquilino Paul Caratti, the 'Joe' of Joesville. Members of the Heritage Guild were privileged to interview Mr. Caratti a few years ago. They recall that it was a memorable experience, according to Janet Newton.

Joe was born in Switzerland and came to Livermore in 1914 where he became an active and generous member of the community. Mrs. Newton had occasion to recall the interview when she appeared before the Livermore Planning Commission in November concerning the permission needed to repaint the Duarte Garage in its original state. She was asked about the space between the Garage and Portola Avenues (formerly Lincoln Highway) and she recalled that Joe had said the highway used to be right in front of the garage where it was part of a sharp and dangerous turn. During the Depression when they were working on the road Joe said he thought to himself, "Everyone else is going broke, I might as well go broke as well..." and therefore decided to give enough of his land to make it possible for the road to be straightened and made safer.

It is also remembered that when the Guild first obtained the lease for the Garage the Caratti family was first to send in a check as a donation towards the restoration.

DUARTE GARAGE PROGRESS: Anyone driving by the corner of Portola and North L Street cannot help but notice the fresh paint job on three sides of the old structure. Soon to come is the original sign work on the front being professionally done by Bill Davidson. Jim Boemke and the Henry A's Club of Livermore have noticed the work also and just donated \$100 from their treasury for the restoration.

The Livermore Planning Commission voted 4-0 last month to approve the proposed original sign for the front of the Garage when Mrs. Newton, Bill Junk and Barry Schrader appeared before the commissioners. There were no protests from surrounding property owners to the

plan either!

CITY FIRE TRUCK

LOANED TO GUILD: The Guild received the old 1944 Mack Fire Department Pumper in good running shape on Dec. 30, 1980 from the city. Truck restoration chairman Jerry Bireley and several board members met at the East Avenue fire station to accept the 50 year loan of the vehicle. Jerry then drove it through town to its new resting place in the Duarte Garage and Lincoln Highway Museum. Along with the truck came four old fire helmets, four portable fire extinguishers, a wooden extension ladder, and some hose with nozzles. Jerry hopes to have the truck repainted and gold-leafed in time for the 1981 Rodeo Parade. Also in the agreement the Guild was loaned the old 1920 Seagrave engine which has been at the Duarte Garage for nearly five years but not officially on loan until now. The Seagraves is in bad shape, having been left outside for many years.

GUILD QUILT SHOW & SALE

PLANS MOVE AHEAD: Henri Fankhauser reports that plans for the HERITAGE QUILT SHOW & SALE II are well along and it will be the weekend of March 21-22 at The Barn. GIFT TO THE GUILD: Janet Newton obtained a frontispiece from a new book that is an oil painting of "Farming in the Livermore Valley" done by Edwin Dealin in 1874. The new book is "The First Hundred Years of Painting in California" published by John Howell Books of San Francisco. Warren Howell donated this full color copy to the History Center via Janet and she will soon have it on display at the Center with photographs of possible sites where the painting was done. Early illustrations of the Livermore Valley are rare and we are glad to have this one for permanent display.

<u>DIE IN DECEMBER</u>: The Guild's former treasurer and membership chairman Capt. William N. Mansfield, USN Retired, died last month. MICROFILMING OF ECHO

APPROVED BY BOARD: The Guild board last month approve the funds to microfilm a group of newspapers from the collection of the late Maitland R. Henry. They are the Livermore Echo from 1887 to 1919. Also to be added to that microfilmed collection are other rare local papers, partly those given to Janet Newton by the late H.J. Callaghan, and some from other sources including many purchased by Janet. The papers are fragile and have a poor life expectancy in their brittle, yellowed condition in many cases. Since many are dates which are not in any other collection known to exist they are especially valuable to historians. The microfilming will be done by the Bancroft Library. The project has been named in honor of the donor--the Maitland R. Henry Memorial. We would be happy to receive contributions toward the continuing expense of having this copy work done. The microfilms will be made available locally to history students and Guild members once the project is completed.

ORAL HISTORY

TAPING BEGUN: The first interview in the Guild's new Oral History Tapes project is completed, with May Nissen the first interview subject. Joan Boer did the taping and also wrote an article on the project in the Herald. Oral History chairman Giovanna Born is holding a workshop for others interested in helping with the tape project on Jan. 8 at 3:30 p.m. in the History Center. More members are needed to undertake the interviewing.

NEW BOARD MEMBER: After receiving the resignation of Genevieve Fraser last month the board found a replacement in John Miller, longtime Oakland Tribune bureau chief in the valley, who has lived in Livermore since 1958. He will join another newsperson, Joan Boer, on the board. She attended her first meeting as a board member in December.

HISTORY CENTER STAYS

<u>OPEN DESPITE LACK OF VOLUNTEERS</u>: Barbara Bunshah faithfully kept the History Center open five afternoons a week all through December despite a lack of volunteers to help staff it on a regular basis. She has one or two docents but needs several more to keep the hours we would like 12 months a year. QUILT SHOW & SALE

PRESERVING A VINEYARD: At its January meeting the LHG board voted to support the preservation of the Stoney Ridge (formerly Ruby Hill) Winery as a vineyard and to oppose its use for a housing development. Letters will go to the appropriate officials to make our stand known. Members are welcome to express their opinion on the issue in private letters to the county planners, our supervisor Don Excell and the newspapers, too.

HOLDENER HOUSE

MAY BE A GIFT: The Holdeners have contacted the Guild to offer their two-story house at the dairy on Stanley Boulevard to us as a gift, allowing the Guild to resell it to anyone who is willing to relocate the historic structure. The board is being polled on the advisability of accepting this generous gift and by February a decision will be reached. The dairy property has been sold to a developer and the house must be moved by April.

EXHIBITS COMING

TO HISTORY CENTER: During February the History Center will feature a copy of the painting titled "Farming in the Livermore Valley" that was given to the LHG by John Howell Books of San Francisco. The original painting was done in 1874 by Edwin Deakin. The artist was born in England in 1838 and emigrated to California. He specialized in paintings of the California missions.

Heritage Guild curator Janet Newton has researched the painting and will display color photos of the site believed to be the same view as the artwork. From the south side of the Arroyo Mocho, looking south, and between the Arroyo Road and Holmes Street the mountains in the background match those in the painting, not only in contour but also in the fact that the lower hills are wooded. In addition, there are still many ancient sycamore trees that could be the one featured in the painting. In the background, at the foot of the wooded hills there is an indication of another tree-filled streambed that could very well be the Arroyo del Valle.

Mrs. Newton doubts the accuracy of the ox-drawn hay wagon in the immediate foreground, thinking that horses were used and a different design of wagon. Also, the house and barn on the south side of the arroyo does not look typical of Livermore, but the location would suggest that it was the home of Daniel Teeter. Let us know what you think???

ANOTHER UPCOMING DISPLAY, planned for April, is an exhibit from the Henry family, centering around an exhibit of carvings of native California birds by Nancy Henry, plus memorabilia from the Maitland Henrys, her parents. Tillie Calhoun and Art Henry are going to assist with the exhibit.

TRIBUTE TO ZYLPHA

BERNAL BECK: (Written by Janet Newton)

Zylpha Bernal Beck, who died in December 1980, was the eldest child of Denis and Josephine Bernal, born at 610 South K St. in Livermore on May 14, 1884. The house is still there, newly renovated. Her mother's parents, Hiram and Casimira Bailey, lived close by. Their house was a two-story one on South L Street in the middle of the long block bounded on the north by College Avenue. It was surrounded by a lovely garden and by grassy fields. Casimira was the eldest of Robert and Josefa Livermore's family.

When Zylpha was small her family lived on Second Street and then in other locations in downtown Livermore. Her father also owned large tracts of land near Livermore, but as Zylpha used to say, her father was not a rancher. Zylpha was a part of the old Spanish way of life through her grandmother Casimira, and through her father, but, since she lived in town she was well acquainted with the ways of the newcomers.

Zylpha once told me that it was said of Casimira that she always had one foot in the stirrup and this was true of Zylpha. Only once, when I called to invite her to go out with us did she not immediately accept. It worried me that she might be sick that time, but she wasn't. She was one of my chief sources of historical information. She not only had great knowledge (and interest) in local history, but she owned a valuable library that she knew how to use to check facts. Besides this, her personal recollections were illuminating and quite precious.

I have two pictures of her in my mind, from her life when she was a young lady with an English pony cart (or trap) and two ponies. One of the pictures is of Zylpha and her classmate Bessie Hargrave driving the cart to the Harlan Ranch at San Ramon. The girls fully intended to stay a week, but so that it wouldn't be obvious when they arrived, they hid their luggage in the barn. Another picture of Zylpha is when, with a companion, she would drive to Oakland, take the ferry to San Francisco and drive up Market Street to her aunt's house near Mission Dolores. Then there is the photo of Zylpha of Zylpha outside her house on Third Street, proudly tending her elegant baby carriage (or perambulator) and wearing a very stylish outfit including a dashing feather in her hat. Did she wear such a hat when she was driving up Market Street I wonder? It seems likely.

Dear Zylpha, we miss you very much.

RAVENSWOOD PUBLIC HEARING: The Livermore Area Recreation and Park District board held a public hearing in January to receive public input on the future possibilities for the old Buckley Estate. Janet Newton represented the Guild at the meeting. There will be more on it from the board after they have collected all the testimony.

PRESERVING HOLDENER

HOUSE & LIVERMORE ADOBE: The board agreed to sell the Holdener Dairy house to Tom Elsnab who will move it to a site adjacent to his home on St. Johns Street in Pleasanton. He has until March 10 to make the purchase for \$1,000 before it is offered to other interested parties.

Bill O'Neal has volunteered to watchdog the Chester Anderson property development which would eventually encompass the site of the Robert Livermore adobe and Round-the-Horn house. He is seeking to have an archeological team work the site before it is subdivided and houses built on it. We may also want to see the adobe site preserved as a park or with a marker on it.

HISTORY CENTER

DISPLAYS ADDED: Curator Janet Newton is working on a display for the East Room of Railways in Livermore History. She is also collecting items for the June Rodeo Month display and will be assisted by board member John Miller in assembling an exhibit on that theme. She has also met with Tillie Calhoun to work out an arrangement for the display of the native Californian bird carvings of Nancy Henry Lyons during April in the West Room. Included will be a limited amount of Henry family history but it is hoped that through the efforts of Mrs. Newton and Art Henry that a more complete family and newspaper history can be assembled for later in the year when more time to research the Henry collection is available.

The Art Association and Heritage Guild will cohost a reception for Nancy Henry Lyons on Sunday, April 5 from 1 to 4 p.m. in the Carnegie Building when the public will be able to meet the artist wood carver as well as other Henry family members.

NEWSPAPER MICROFILMING

PROJECT MOVING ALONG: Thanks to Janet and Ralph Newton the first reel of Livermore Echo newspapers up to 1893 has been microfilmed and they are now working on more in conjunction with the Bancroft Library. Mrs. Newton relates how this project got started. "Several years ago one afternoon Art Henry phoned to say he had found a collection of Echo's in his late father's garage and offered them to us for historical safekeeping. He drove over that same day with a carload of papers that filled a six foot square space in the utility room of our home. After having been stored so long and then moved they were in disarray and even folded twice. Fortunately (the late) Julia Kleinecke happened to be at the house and she volunteered to flatten them and put them in order. Later, Bill Junk made a fine cabinet to hold them, and Randy Schlientz provided large sheets of cardboard on which to store the fragile papers." Barbara Bunshah, Guild librarian and assistant curator, as well as

Barbara Bunshah, Guild librarian and assistant curator, as well as docents and Community Involvement chairperson for the History Center, has now agreed to make an index of the Echo issues, thus adding to the immense amount of indexing she has already done on other local papers.

OTHER LHG NEWS: Anyone driving past North L Street and Portola Avenue the past month will notice more progress at the Duarte Garage and Lincoln Highway Museum. The front windows have now all been replaced with plexiglass (less breakable) and the two automobile brands "Star" and "Durant" are painted on the windows. Also the dead trees along the L Street side of the building have been removed by the city as well as a driveway cut into the street by the cottage, thanks to Dan Lee, city Public Works Director who had the work done.

MONTHLY MEETING: Thursday, April 9, at 7:30 p.m. at History Center. A representative of Stony Ridge Winery has been invited to discuss the future of the vineyards.

DISPLAY OPENS: Livermore native Nancy Henry Lyons has her Waterfowl in Wood historic woodcarvings on exhibit at the History Center all this month. HISTORIC BIRD We will be co-hosting a reception for her Sunday, April 4 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Carnegie Building. It is open to all members and friends. The Art Association is also involved in the reception. Another display on the same subject is at the Livermore Public Library.

RAILROAD EXHIBIT ALSO BEING FEATURED: A new Livermore Railroads Exhibit in the East Room of the History Center created by curator Janet Newton commemorates the grand opening of the long-planned State Railroad Museum in Sacramento which has its dedication May 1-3. Livermore's part in railroading includes the story of Charles McLaughlin whose name appears on the earliest maps of the valley. In 1864 McLaughlin contracted with the Western Pacific (soon to be absorbed by Central Pacific) to build a railroad from San Jose to Sacramento (via Livermore). The firm of Cox & Meyers became subcontractors, but they ceased work when they had used up their funds and McLaughlin did not reimburse them. In 1865 McLaughlin sold his interest in the then Western Pacific to Leland Stanford & Co. McLaughlin never did pay the Cox & Meyers firm, though he soon became a millionaire. He acquired vast acreage through federal land grants to the railroads. But in 1883 an angry Cox went to McLaughlin's San Francisco officer and shot him dead. Cox was acquitted and the estate had to pay the claim.

QUILT SHOW & SALE TREMENDOUS SUCCESS: Few would imagine that the Quilt Show & Sale chaired by Henri and Chet Fankhauser would draw the hundreds of people or net more than \$700 after expenses for the two days, but it did! The Barn was filled with some 70 display quilts, plus a sales area and demonstration area. The Girl Scouts ran the food concession and paid the Guild a percentage. Including sales, more than \$1300 was taken in. A lot of thanks go to Dee Wilson and husband for their hard work in organizing the quilt hanging task.

HOLDENER HOUSE PUBLIC HEARING SET: In order for Fred and Mary Spaeth to move the Holdener House to their lot between College Ave. and Sherry Way a public hearing has to be held to hear any protests. It will be Tuesday, April 7 before the Planning Commission. At the same time the Guild is pressing for a waiver in the City House Moving Ordinance which would make it prohibitive and too costly for Spaeth to follow through. Members are welcome to attend the April 7 hearing at the council chambers. There is opposition which may surface that night.

ADOBE SITE REPORT: Guild member Bill O'Neal has spearheaded the effort to assure that the Livermore Adobe site on the Chester Anderson property is preserved and possibly an archeological dig conducted there. He wrote to the city to notify them of the value of the site, so it was noted in the city Environmental Impact Report. Bill also met with Anderson and has scouted the site for possible digging by an archeological team. He will continue to watchdog the progress of the planned housing development on the Anderson property to seek its preservation as an historic site.

UPCOMING SOCIAL EVENTS
FOR THE GUILD MEMBERS: Instead of our May board meeting we will hold an informal open house at the Carnegie Building to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the opening of the city library there. Barbara Bunshaw and Kitsy Junk are organizing the event which will include all living former library workers and its board, plus citizens who have supported the library over the years. The date and time will be forthcoming in the May newsletter. ALSO COMING UP is the annual Heritage Guild dinner meeting, hopefully to be held Friday night, June 12 at a local restaurant. Chairman Barry Schrader will ask the board for final approval once a meal price is obtained. He has gotten tentative agreement to feature Livermore's former world champion rodeo cowboyJohnie Schneider (now of Salinas) to return and speak. The theme of the dinner would be Livermore's Rodeo history and John Miller has volunteered to help with a Rodeo exhibit for June at the History Center. Anyone having rodeo material or memorabilia relating to cowboys locally is asked to contact the Guild so it might be included in the display.

NEW BOOKS AT HISTORY CENTER REFERENCE LIBRARY: A copy of the transcript of the taped interview with Ernest Wente made by the Oral History Department of the Bancroft Library has been added to our resources. This copy is restricted and can only be used by contacting our assistant curator and librarian Barbara Bunshaw. Another large reference work is the gift of Ralph and Janet Newton. It's called CARRELL OF CORAL HOLLOW by Earle E. Williams, 658 pages (both sides) including an index by Dan Mosier. It weighs more tham three pounds! The book is based on the diaries of Edward B. Carrell dated from 1868 to 1880. Other reference materials are being added, so talk to Barbara if you need additional information about local history. The Guild recently provided information and the oral tape of Miss May Nissen for a newspaper column that paid tribute to this Livermore pioneer. It was published in the Valley Times March 29. We are always looking for additional information about Miss Nissen and other pioneers, so if you have any material or knowledge that would be helpful please contact Barbara Bunshaw who is at the History Center Wednesday through Sunday from noon to 4 p.m. The phone there is 449-9927 but is usually answered by the Art Gallery workers since they have it in their name.

SAVING BRUSHY PEAK

CONNECTED TO WINDMILL FARMS? Conservationist and Zone 7 Board member

Margaret Tracy reports that she has met with the developer of the proposed wind energy project atop the Altamont and he may donate money as a part of the deal to help preserve Brushy Peak on the Walker ranch property. He does not now plan to erect windmills on the Peak, and for years there has been concern over the fate of the historic and picturesque landmark. It is too fragile a wilderness environment to make it a park, but a limited access wilderness area might be the answer according to Mrs. Tracy. The Guild will want to keep alert to any changes being planned in its preservation.






A PICTORIAL LOOK AT GUILD PROJECTS

The picnic will begin at 6 p.m. at the old winery building, a tour of the facilities will take place at 7 p.m. and our Board meeting will be at 7:45 p.m. inside the old brick structure. Those planning to attend MUST CALL us in advance as the Guild will provide the meat course and drinks. Call the Schraders at 449-7888 evenings before Aug. 9 and learn what to bring—plus your own table service. We have skipped the August meeting some years, but this time have business to conduct plus the thought of enjoying a nice outdoor picnic was too good to pass up, and the winery's invitation was accepted!

MORE ITEMS ADDED

TO GUILD's COLLECTION: During the dedication event at the Duarte Garage and Lincoln Highway Museum in June we received the oldest Livermore Fire Chief's uniform—jacket, belt and cap from Warner Andersen. On the carved leather belt is engraved "J.H. Mahoney - 1874." The first fire company in Livermore was formed in October 1874 with Mahoney as president. It was the Livermore Hook & Ladder Company No. 1. The belt also has "President" carved on into it and has a big No. 1 on it. Mahoney was the husband of Antonia Livermore, one of Robert Livermore's daughters.

John Jensen, one of Livermore's elder residents, says that there used to be 15 or 20 of these uniforms hanging in the fire house and that the men looked

very smart in them, manning the pumper apparatus.

Another recent acquisition, a gift from Livermore High School thanks to Librarian Emily Crowley, is a set of 32 school yearbooks from LHS. Six issues are of the "Green and Gold" years and 26 others are "El Vaquero" named.

MEMORIAL DONATIONS: We have received donations in memory of Dr. Roger Hardy and Miss May Nissen. Miss Nissen was the principal speaker at the first annual dinner of the Guild in September 1974 and her death this July means a great loss in the community to all she had ever touched. Her funeral at the Livermore Presbyterian Church was attended by many who had known her or were her pupils during her long tenure as a teacher in Livermore.

HISTORY TAPE SET

GIVEN TO LIBRARY: The first 10 oral history tapes, interviews with oldtimers from this Valley, have been turned over to the Livermore Public Library by Tapes project committee chairperson Vana Born. We still have one set, and the library now has the duplicates so people can go there during regular hours and listen to them on a recorder there. Vana is to be congratulated on taking this project from its inception last fall. She will be leaving this month for a year's teaching assignment in Canada. We wish her well in that exciting educational exchange experience and will welcome her back to the Guild and the community in the fall of 1982. Due to her being out of the country for a year she had to resign from the Board. A replacement is being sought.

MORE MICROFILMING

PLANNED BY GUILD: Now that the first batch of Livermore Echo papers has been microfilmed Guild curator Janet Newton is preparing another set, including the 1914 Herald issues. These were inadvertently omitted from copying in 1969 when the newspaper converted its files to film. Also being done are a broken set of heretofore missing issues of the Herald purchased by the Newtons, plus some copied from Bancroft which cover the years 1879 to 1899. They have never before been available for public use.

RODEO DISPLAY ENDING:

ARTS FESTIVAL HISTORY NEXT: The well atrended Livermore Rodeo display done by John Miller and Mrs. Newton is about to be dismantled after a two month show and by September we hope to have a new display showing the history of the Fall Arts Festivals in Livermore. Bev Hamlin will coordinate the exhibit and anyone having items to loan or wishing to help can call her at 846-1455.

ARTIFACT FROM

MISSION SAN JOSE: Mrs. Newton has been following the excavation of the floor of the old adobe mission of San Jose at Fremont where Robert Livermore's tombstone was uncovered this spring. His marker is a handsome slab of white marble incised with lettering covered with gold leaf. Mission pastor Rev. William N. Abeloe presented her with a small fragment of the tile floor from the mission. It is now in the History Center where assistant curator and Guild librarian Barbara Bunshah can show it to you.

Mrs. Newton also received photographs and information for the Guild about the Cummings Manganese mines from Mrs. Dorothy Fitton. Geologist and mine specialist member Dan Mosier says that the manganese mines were just as important to Livermore as the Tesla coal mines. He supplied the Guild with

additional information on the mines.

SUPPORT FOR SAVING

THE VALLEY VINEYARDS: The Guild board was the first group back in February to act in support of preserving the Stoney Ridge Winery which is threatened with a residential development project. We took a stand in support of keeping the land in vineyards and preserving the winery building as well. Now a valley committee called Save the Vineyards has been formed to preserve not only this former Ruby Hill property but also Cresta Blanca's site and other vineyards that may be eyed for building sites in the coming years. The new organization appointed our retiring Guild chairman Barry Schrader as its chairman and will be holding an informational open house at the winery on Aug. 7. All are welcome to come and learn more about the effort.


REROOFING OF DUARTE
